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My dog growls at new puppy

Getting a new puppy is exciting - at least for the humans of the family. Sometimes the house dog does not think that the PUP is a welcome addition, however. Many people believe that adding a puppy to the family will be harmonious, and that their current dog will be a good "mom" or "daddy" dog. They are disappointed when it doesn't happen. Often, expectations are not realistic, but in most cases that members of the human family see instead of such expectations is completely normal. Know in advance what to expect a new puppy to the family as simple as possible. What to expect I had the unique experience of welcoming 15 puppies in our house over the past 12 years. Communication skills puppies are simply learning how to communicate with each other. Usually, puppies have only had experience by reading their own steps and mother. Their communication capacities are still developing and do not know the "road rules" when it comes to interacting with new and different dogs. When comparing the way the puppies play the way in which adult dogs play, the differences are vast. Dogs follow a prescribed set of rules. There is a whole ways of manners that adult dogs sign up and makes their predictable and pleasant social interactions. There is a shared language between dogs, and adult dogs are flowing in that language. The puppies do not follow the rules exist! When littermate puppies play together, the only rule is: not to each other. I saw a bloody puppy skipped on his bed of bed to sleep with reckless abandonment. Upon awakening, that the littering are joyfully engaged with the jumper. With that kind of feedback, it's easy to understand why puppies don't understand that the world has rules. When a puppy arrives in a new home without another puppy with a view to play with, naturally it collects the next closest thing: the adult dog. And the growl is not enough to discourage the puppy to relaunch himself on the sleepy dog, a full view of teeth together with the most guttural growl that you have ever heard the puppy to cease and desist. Listen to this according to the our Adults, puppies have really scarce social skills and have a lot to learn. Our adult dogs have been valuable teachers to the puppies we have hosted, and we are grateful to them. The first lesson the puppy learns is where the lines are drawn. There are not many things that our dogs teach the puppy: an adult dog communicates a puppy that has crossed the line. line. Jump on my head. Don't steal the toy I'm playing with not putting your face in my bowl when I'm eating. Don't walk on me. Don't bite your ears or tail. They don't sit on me. Do not bark in the face. They don't quickly and can torment an old dog for much more time than the dog would allow. The use of the clicker can help a more old dog to understand what behavior you would like to see from him in relation to the new puppy. A healthy side effect of using the clicker to facilitate the transition is that the model creates a happy association with the new puppy for the existing dog. When the new puppy is around, the older dog will have the opportunity to earn clicks and sweets. Think about what behavior you would like to see from your dog that is not too difficult to realize. Using the example above, doing something different from growling to a puppy could be good behavior to click and treat. Remember that your responsibility for the existing dog is to keep the puppy far enough that it cannot annoy the existing dog. It is up to you to make sure that the existing dog is able to click and treat yourself easily, then make sure you use Tetherher, speakers and gates to help your dog earn a click. I will not put the existing dog in a position where it resists its natural nature "Doggie Nature" to withstand the unpleasant puppy interactions only to earn a click and treat. Make sure that the existing dog is enjoying the interaction and is patient and tolerant because it is beginning to enjoy the interaction with the puppy, and not simply stand it for the training sake. Using the clicker to strengthen the appropriate behavior, together with limiting the access of the existing dog, translates into a setting for both success. Manage the situation and provide a trained clicker guide on what is appropriate ... for the puppy and the existing dog. Danger signs not all dogs like puppies. Some dogs do not tolerate puppies at all and can have over-the-top reactions that could damage the puppy. It is important to keep a watchful eye on the interactions, and intervene when the body language and communication intensify at an unsafe level.
